CITY SPOTLIGHT: BAKER CITY

Baker City is located in scenic Northeast Oregon, at the intersection of three Oregon Scenic Byways and nestled between the Wallowa and Elkhorn Mountains. The city has a population of approximately 9,900 people and is located on I-84, 300 miles east of Portland. Our vibrant downtown boasts more than 100 buildings on the National Register of Historic Places and is home to quaint restaurants, galleries and independent retail shops.

The city has just completed an updated wastewater management plan. Our existing wastewater treatment facility was constructed in the 1960s and is long past its estimated lifespan. The new plan calls for the addition of a 100-acre storage facility plus land application of the treated effluent.

The city will be partnering with local ranchers to pump the water onto agricultural ground. The cost of the project is approximately \$10 million and the city council has been adjusting wastewater rates to pay for the project.

Baker City gets the bulk of its water from the Elkhorn Mountains. The city has embarked on a 20-year plan to upgrade the water delivery system. We are in the process of replacing approximately a mile of piping each year and the rate structure is in place to complete this project within the next 15 years.

The city also has an outstanding park system and a great trail system that bisects the city. We added a large park in the last five years and are continuing to enhance the amenities. This past year we have added terracing to the parks amphitheater, constructed a labyrinth, added public art fixtures and improved lighting. This was accomplished with the use of grant funding, private donations and volunteer labor.



Recently a citizen approached the city about setting up a beautification committee. The city worked with this individual to facilitate a meeting. From that initial meeting, a citizen committee has spontaneously formed with over 20 people attending on a regular basis. They have divided



the city into zones and are vigorously working to clean the major arteries into the city. The feedback from this committee has people all over the city cleaning up their properties. It is amazing what one champion for a cause can do to enhance livability within our community.

Baker City has an amazing historic district. Baker City has historically been a Performing Main Street Organization within the Oregon Main Street Program. Over time we lost our momentum and dropped out of the program. This past year a new downtown organization has been formed and we are once again a part of the Main Street Program focusing on façade upgrades, event planning and promotions.

Baker City is home to many events each year. The Hells Canyon Motorcycle Rally, the Baker City Cycling Classic, the quirky Salt Lick Auction, the Miners Jubilee Festival, the Eastern Oregon Tributefest (rock and roll)



and the We Like 'Em Short Film Festival are but a few of the extraordinary happenings within the city.

We are looking forward to the summer months when the visitors come to our city to enjoy the sunshine, natural beauty and hospitality that only Eastern Oregon can provide.

Sustainable City Year Program Helps Cities Reach Goals

ities in Oregon must address quality of life issues Such as affordable housing, social service provision, community engagement, economic and equitable development, and resource conservation with limited staff and financial resources. The University of Oregon's Sustainable City Year Program (SCYP) works with an Oregon community each year to help advance work plans around these issues. The scale of engagement—leveraging 20-60,000 hours and between 10-30 courses over a single year -expedites innovation into local government, creates political space for creative problem solving, increases capacity to move projects forward, accelerates new policy and practice adoption, re-charges and empowers staff, helps address problems from diverse perspectives, and trains the future workforce in multi-disciplinary problem solving.

Working within the existing administrative structures of both the city/county and university, SCYP helps move community's existing challenging, vexing and exciting project goals forward while 10-20 faculty and 200-500 students bring energy, enthusiasm, and innovative approaches to difficult problems. Partners support the effort through staff time and a fee, and the selection process is competitive. Past SCYP partners include Redmond, Salem, Springfield, Gresham, La Pine, TriMet, Albany and Medford.
